HISTORIAN'S CORNER



A friend of mine just bought a 1960 Duo Glide pan head that has had only three owners and was originally in a police department fleet. The final owner was the mechanic for the department, so I suspect it is pretty clean. I can't wait to see it in person. He pulled up a YouTube video on how to start the vintage bike so I could hear the engine (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=EzoZnBsOh_g). I was

more fascinated by the multiple steps needed to start it – the gas tank has oil on one side, gas on

the other – there is a primer, fuel valve, choke and then you have to "wind up" the kick starter before you actually throw a hip out kicking it to start – not to mention working the suicide clutch. The rear suspension is in the seat, which doesn't look all that comfortable. The Duo Glide is a second bike to his Ultra, so he doesn't plan on riding it more than locally. I think he needs to start going to the gym, it looks like a work out to me.



My Heritage Softail Classic is a 2000 and I feel rather vintage with having a choke and fuel valve. After seeing this video, I appreciate the convenience of the electric start, the advances of the suspension and comfort of the seats. I do remember kick starting bikes – I had a Honda 350 in the 70s that was a kick-start – though much easier than the 1960. The Honda's seat also had to be cut in half so I could reach the ground comfortably. Now you can find most of the Harley models with a lower model or you can have the bike lowered. Seats can be changed to better fit the rider as well. Progress is good.

I marvel at how far we've come and wonder what will we see in the near and far future?

The new Road King announced recently to the Harley Owners Training (HOT) has a retro look to it and as they say "The 2017 Harley-Davidson Road King Special fuses 1950's look with a modern powertrain." It has the new Milwaukee-Eight engine, larger wheels, bigger sweeping saddlebags and a blacked-out styling.

What will the 2037 Harley look like and what advances will we see? In my head, I'm seeing Tron-like motorcycles and motorcycle only roads. I'm hoping they retain their current appearance with some safety features not invented yet, like a bill board sized hologram saying "CAN YOU SEE ME NOW?" when a car approaches.

Last year I remember seeing a BMW video of the bike of the future – a self-balancing unit with interactive rider glasses. I wasn't too impressed, but it does look a little like the ones used in the movie Tron – glorified crotch rockets.

One day at the gym, an older woman saw my Harley shirt and asked if I rode. I told her I did and she immediately got her husband's attention and said "Harold, this young lady rides a Harley like we did!" We had a very nice discussion and they told me about their matching bikes and the trips they took. You could still see the Harley sparkle in their eyes as they talked. That was a look at my future, but hopefully I'm still able to ride – it might be a trike, but I hope to be able to ride for years to come.

Get Your Motorcycle Ready for Riding Season

The beginning of spring marks the first time in a few months that many motorcycles have been out of the garage. Before you ride, take a close look at your ride from the ground up.

Tires – Start by checking the air pressure in both tires. Tires lose pressure slowly over time. Low tire pressure can make motorcycles hard to handle and increase wear and tear on the tires. This is a particular concern after your bike has spent a winter in the garage because air pressure decreases with colder temperatures. While you're looking at your tires, check for cracks, dry rot, or other damage, and make sure your tread is in good shape. If you left your motorcycle sitting in the same position for a while, the tires may

have developed flat spots that could cause handling problems.

Brakes – While you're down there checking your tires, take time to inspect your brake pads. Worn pads that got you through the end of last season may need replacing before you hit the road this year. Check your brake lines for cracks and leaks, and make sure that your brake fluid reservoir is full. Test your front and rear brakes separately to make sure that they work and listen for scraping or squealing noises that can indicate trouble.

Battery – If your bike has been sitting for a while, the battery may need a charge. Before you start up, check both terminals for dust, dirt, and corrosion. Make sure the terminals are clean and the cables are securely connected.

Fluids – Motorcycles need a lot of fluid to run smoothly, from oil and gas to hydraulic and brake fluids. Checking your fluids at the end of a long winter means more than just making sure all the reservoirs are full. Fluids left sitting for a couple of months may degrade, so look for changes, in color and consistency, and replace any fluid that looks dirty or different than it did when you put it in. This is a good time to check your manufacture's suggested schedule for changing fluids. If you missed a scheduled change over the winter, now you can atone for the lapse. Remember to check your oil filter and inspect fluid lines for cracks or signs of leakage.

Controls – Try out your steering, throttle, clutch, and other controls to make sure they still work. Check cables for fraying, signs of corrosion, or damage to coverings. Check lines and hoses for cracks, cuts, or other signs of a leak. Make sure that none of your control cables or hoses are folded or kinked, and test the steering to make sure you can move freely without snagging anything.

Belts and Chains – Whether your bike has a drive belt or a drive chain, make sure it's in good shape and has the correct tension. Check your drive belt for signs of cracking or tearing, or check your drive chain for damaged teeth.

Lights – After an accident involving a car and a motorcycle, drivers often swear that they never saw a bike. Your safety depends on your ability to get drivers' attention. Make sure your headlights, brake lights, turn signals, and flashers are all working and connected securely. And make sure your lenses are clean, and test both the high and low beams. Test your horn while you're at it – it could be a lifesaver.

Safety Equipment – Before you ride, check your helmet for cracks, dents, or other damage. Make sure the inner lining is clean. Try your leathers on to make sure they still fit comfortably. Pull out your emergency kit and take a quick inventory – verify that nothing is missing, expired, or broken.

Yourself – Take it easy when you first hit the road. You will be relying on skills that you may not have used for a few months, so give yourself some time to get up to speed.


